So it's little wonder Mertens likes his chances in the \$500,000 Cranbourne Cup. Not even drawing awkwardly in barrier 16 has dented his confidence in the Gavin Bedggood-trained No Effort.

Mertens already knows his race tactics with No Effort racing best when settling on the pace, but the long Cranbourne back straight will suit the mare.

"She's usually pretty quick out of the gates and doesn't usually take much time to muster speed," Mertens said.

"It's a pretty long straight down the back there at Cranbourne so you've got plenty of time to figure it out. She comes into this race a lot better off and if it rains, she'll be a leading contender in the race.'

No Effort was a winner at Listed level in the Heatherlie Handicap three runs back before producing a sound effort when beaten four lengths in the Group 3 Naturalism Stakes in September.

in September. Mertens said a similar effort would ensure No Effort would be hard to beat.

"She didn't get beaten far ei-ther in the Naturalism and ran well against Group 1 horses there," Mertens said.

"She's honest and if she's

going as well as she was then, she'll be right in the race." Bedggood and Mertens will again combine with noted wet-

tracker Sir Kalahad in the Apache Cat Classic (1000m). Sir Kalahad finished three

Sir Kalahad finished three lengths from winner The Inferno in the Group 2 McEwen Stakes at The Valley two runs back but was outgunned in a small field at Sale last time out. Mertens said heavy ground would produce a marked improvement from Sir Kalahad.

"If we're racing on a heavy track, he's going to be very well suited," Mertens said.

No Effort is a \$19 chance in Cranbourne Cup betting while Sir Kalahad is a \$15 chance to land the Apache Cat Classic.

Record betting spend on Cox Plate Carnival

THE two-meeting Cox Plate Carnival was the latest Spring Carnival event to report record

betting figures.
Cox Plate Carnival betting figures followed the same upward trend as the Melbourne Cup Carnival after the Victoria Racing Club reported a hefty wagering turnover increase earlier in the week.

Punters bet \$183m in the 24-hour racing bonanza, which started with the Manikato Stakes meeting on the Friday night and continued with another 10 races on the Saturday.

Plate Day betting reached \$133.7m, a rise of 9.3 per cent on last yearwith the day's field sizes up by the same amount on 2020 levels

The Cox Plate itself was a dramatic affair with import Gold Trip and the well-backed favourite Zaaki both scratched in the lead-up to the weight-

in the lead-up to the degree for-age championship. Irish trainer Joseph O'Brien added a Cox Plate to his two Melbourne Cup wins when State Of Rest narrowly defeated Anamoe in a controversial finish to the event, which was settled in the stewards'

The Manikato Stakes turnover figures provided a highlight for the Moonee Valley Racing Club.
The Manikato Stakes itself

was a victim of Racing NSW's assault on the Melbourne Spring Carnival being posi-tioned a week after The Ever-est, which many said produced a below-par field.

However, punters bet a night racing record of \$49.6m on the eight races on Manikato Stakes night, eclipsing the re-cord of \$48.2m set a month earlier on Moir Stakes night.

MVRC chief executive Michael Browell said the record

betting figures showed The Valley's two-meeting Cox Plate Carnival format was a

Browell said the turnover figures were especially pleas-ing as the financial impact of having no Cox Plate crowds stretched into a second year.

'In a year where the club has taken a significant financial hit with no crowds attending our marquee two-day Ladbrokes Cox Plate Carnival, we are delighted to see a record result for wagering which continues the current trend across the industry," Browell said.
